

Women Recyclers Empowerment Initiative (WREI):

Conducted business education training and skill acquisition programs.

Provided essential kits, business education, and skill acquisition training to 512 women. Empowered women with skills for entrepreneurship, increased cleanliness in their environment, and recovered 22,300.00kg of materials.

Waste for Justice Initiative:

Partnership with Hope Behind Bars Africa (HBBA) and the Nigerian Bar Association (NBA). Provided legal representation for indigent pre-trial detainees using recyclable wastes.

Contributed to the alleviation of overcrowding, access to justice, and rehabilitation of beneficiaries.

CASH FOR TRASH INITIATIVE

In continuation of our commitment to increase material recovery and recycling in our environment, we operated 15 Cash for Trash recycling hubs across 13 communities in both the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) and Lagos State. Through the active recycling efforts of residents in these communities, we recovered and diverted 140,352.60 kilograms of recyclable waste from our streets and landfills between January 2023 and November 2023.



This significant achievement not only contributes to the reduction of environmental impact but also exemplifies our dedication to fostering a cleaner, greener future for our communities.

Alongside our goals of promoting environmental sustainability, we are dedicated to creating green jobs and supporting the livelihoods of members of our host communities. To this end, we have supported 28 full-time staff members to manage the seamless operations of the hubs. We appreciate the generous support of our sponsors, The Coca-Cola Foundation (TCCF), the Embassy of Switzerland, and the British High Commission in the establishment of the hubs. We also appreciate our implementation partners, Chanja Datti Recycling Ltd and Wecyclers whose unwavering commitment and collaborative efforts have been crucial to the seamless operations of the hubs.

We are currently in the process of establishing 2 additional hubs in the Lugbe and Gwagwalada area.

PROTECT 10,000 INITIATIVE

Recognizing the importance of members of the informal waste sector in the waste management sector in Nigeria, we engaged with some leaders of waste aggregators in Lugbe and Gwagwalada to appreciate their tireless efforts in material recovery and recycling, and to strengthen relations.



We organized a day training in Gwagwalada on the 21st of September 2023, in partnership with Jaiz Bank Plc. and Chanja Datti Ltd. to equip them with financial literacy training, financial inclusion, exposure to access to financial credit for their businesses, health and safety training and work kits. We provided gloves, safety jackets, and sacks to 100 attendees to aid their work activities.

The training was sponsored by the UNDP Global Environment Facility (GEF) Small Grants Programme (SGP).

BOTTLES FOR BOOKS INITIATIVE

Our commitment to ensuring that beneficiaries of the Bottles for Books Initiative at LEA Kabusa remain in school and continue to receive their basic human right of access to education remains resolute. Recognizing the important role parents play in shaping their children's educational journey, we engage with them to encourage their continued participation and reiterate the importance of education in the development of a child and society.



We visited Dagbana community in Jikwoyi area of the Abuja Municipal Area Council where we identified a high number of out-of-school children. During our visit, we engaged with community leaders and parents, presenting the potential of the initiative and its transformative impact on their community. The enthusiastic response we received highlighted the community's anticipation and eagerness for the successful execution of the project. The project will be executed in the coming year as we receive more funding and donations of materials.

We facilitated the payment of tuition for over 100 pupils at LEA Kabusa by leveraging waste brought in by their parents as a valuable currency. Similarly, 21 pupils at LEA Gwarimpa benefited from this initiative using recyclable materials collected from Transcorp Hilton Abuja, the Development Bank of Nigeria, the US Embassy, and the Embassy of Switzerland. This was achieved in collaboration with Chanja Datti Recycling Ltd.

Our network of collaborators continues to grow, with organizations such as the Shehu Musa Yar'adua Center, the Nigeria Sovereign Investment Authority (NSIA), and Broadoaks British School intensifying their recycling efforts to support children with access to education in the coming year.

We were able to recover and recycle 8,488.50kg of materials through the initiative.

WOMEN RECYCLERS EMPOWERMENT INITIATIVE (WREI)

Another phase of the Women Recyclers Empowerment Initiative was initiated this year, reaching out to nine communities in Lugbe and Gwagwalada areas of the FCT. This phase successfully onboarded 512 women from communities including Pyakasa, Piwoyi, Aleyita, Chika, and Karonmajigi (Lugbe Area); and Dagiri, Gwako, New Kutunku, and Tunga-maje (Gwagwalada Area).



Each participant was provided with essential kits, including gloves, reflective jackets, masks, and sacks, and health and safety training to enhance their work activities. The women will also be issued identification cards to further legitimize and recognize their roles.

In May 2023, a crucial partnership with Chanja Datti, sponsored by Nestlé Plc., enabled the execution of a business education training of 50 beneficiaries on merchandising and effective business management. The training aimed to equip them with the skills needed to not only start but also manage and grow their retail businesses.

Later in November 2023, we organized a two-day skill acquisition training for 100 active women recyclers in partnership with The Skilled Women Initiative (TSWINI), focusing on baking and confectionery. The training sessions were conducted at LEA Tunga-maje on the 3rd and 4th of November for women in Gwagwalada area, and on the 13th and 14th of November at Chika New Palace for women in the Lugbe area. The training was sponsored by the UNDP Global Environment Facility (GEF) Small Grants Programme (SGP). The participants displayed great enthusiasm, expressing excitement about starting their small businesses using the acquired skills.

Through the initiative, we recovered 22,300.00kg of materials from their immediate environment. There has been feedback on the noticeable increase in the cleanliness of their environment since the project's initiation.

WASTE FOR JUSTICE INITIATIVE

The Waste for Justice Initiative was developed to provide indigent pre-trial detainees charged with minor misdemeanors with access to legal representation. Our primary goal is to provide these individuals with access to crucial legal representation, contribute to the alleviation of overcrowding in correctional facilities, and ensure quick access to justice for those awaiting trial.



As part of our efforts to amplify the impact of the initiative, we partnered with Hope Behind Bars Africa (HBBA), a social enterprise that provides free legal representations for indigent pre-trial detainees to facilitate a speedy resolution of their matters in court and supports them with rehabilitation and reintegration programmes.

In addition to our partnership with HBBA, we have forged a collaboration with the Nigerian Bar Association (NBA) Abuja secretariat to convert recyclable wastes generated from their facilities to support identified beneficiaries of the project.

OTHER PROJECTS

COLLABORATION WITH THE UNDP GLOBAL ENVIRONMENT FACILITY (GEF) SMALL GRANTS PROGRAMME (SGP)



We are thrilled to announce that we are recipients of the UNDP Global Environment Facility (GEF) Small Grants Programme (SGP) amounting to \$50,000. The fund is to execute a project on reducing marine plastic pollution through recycling in Lugbe and Gwagwalada areas of the FCT.

The project targets the issue of plastic pollution in water bodies in Abuja which has risen due to challenges posed by fast-paced urbanization and waste management. The Wupa and Usuma Rivers, situated in the Lugbe and Gwagwalada areas are the focal points of our efforts. The project is designed to make a meaningful impact on the communities that surround these water bodies. In the Lugbe area, we will be collaborating with the communities of Pyakasa, Piwoyi, Aleyita, Chika, and Karonmajigi. In the Gwagwalada area, our outreach will extend to Dagiri, Gwako, Giri, New Kutunku, and Tunga-maje.

COLLABORATION WITH THE UNDP GLOBAL ENVIRONMENT FACILITY (GEF) SMALL GRANTS PROGRAMME (SGP)

The primary objective of the project is to reduce marine plastic pollution through community participation in source segregation and the recovery of plastic waste and other recyclable materials. We aim to reintegrate these materials into the value chain system, fostering a sustainable approach to waste management. Additionally, our initiative seeks to induce behavioral change and empower community members through the creation of job opportunities and capacity-building programs.

With the \$50,000 grant, we have been able to empower 512 women to become local recyclers and provide 100 waste pickers and aggregators with social inclusion. In addition, 100 active women recyclers have undergone skill acquisition training, increasing their capabilities and creating opportunities for personal and entrepreneurial growth. We have recovered 22,300.00kg of waste from the environment. We are also establishing 2 recycling hubs to service some communities in Lugbe and Gwagwalada.

To ensure transparency and community involvement, we conducted a stakeholders' engagement session. This session provided an opportunity to review the project's progress, connect with beneficiaries, and discuss the way forward. The attendees included community heads and women leaders from host communities, and representatives from partner organizations such as the Abuja Environmental Protection Board (AEPB), Satellite Town Development Department (STDD), and Chanja Datti Recycling Ltd. We were honored to have Mrs. Ibironke Olubamise, the National Coordinator of the Small Grants Programme in Nigeria, present at the event.

SCHOOL RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS PROGRAM

To promote the adoption of sustainable waste management practices among young people in Nigeria, we distributed 10 recycling cages to 9 public schools in the FCT. The students and schools are to actively engage in recycling activities as a means to promote the cleanliness of their school and encourage behavioral change that extends beyond the school premises, creating a ripple effect within the wider community.

Empowering young people with the knowledge and tools for responsible waste management will contribute to building a more environmentally conscious and sustainable future. The project was sponsored by The Coca-Cola Foundation (TCCF).


